The US should fully realize the harmfulness and sensitivity of selling arms to Taiwan and stop doing so so as not to undermine China-US relations as well as the peaceful development of cross-Straits relations."

[...]The code proposed in the letter to Ban is a bid to promote multilateral, transparent and democratic management of the Internet."



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
